Ready to Learn Behaviour System



Between each stage, children are given opportunities to change their behaviour. A range of positive behaviour management strategies, including warnings or reminders will be given before a consequence. Children will be given the opportunity to move from the negative consequence stage back to the positive – back to green and above.



Uniform

The St James school uniform consists of:

All children (Nursery – Year 6) need:

- burgundy St James crew neck sweat shirt/sweatshirt cardigan
- white polo t-shirt or shirt
- grey or black school trousers/skirt/pinafore dress
- black flat sensible school shoes (shoes are to be plain with no coloured logos)
- St James book bag
- In warm weather girls may wear a red gingham dress and boys grey/black shorts
- Optional burgundy St James zip fleece

In warm weather caps and sunglasses are encouraged

Windows will remain open during winter months to increase the ventilation within the classroom. Therefore you may wish to send your child in with an additional jumper to keep them warm.



Homework – KS1

• Reading/sharing books with parents/carers daily and recording in the reading diary (at least 3 times).

• Children will be given a list of spellings to learn which will follow the spelling patterns taught in their phased groups or linked to curriculum (weekly).

• As and when required, homework linked to basic skills and retrieval eg. number bonds, rapid recall facts.

• In Year 2, children will begin to learn multiplication facts 2, 5, 10 (and starting on 3 when ready) using Times Table Rock Stars which will be introduced to friendship the children in the Autumn term.

Let us Thrive

Each day the children have a morning task to do on entry to the classroom. This time is used to enhance basic skills such as reading, handwriting and simple maths recall. Following this there is a daily assembly. Pupils complete a Maths, Phonics and English lesson in the morning followed by Maths rapid recall and wider curriculum subjects in the afternoon. To finish each day the children have a class story time together to provide them with an opportunity to experience a variety of texts and encourage reading for enjoyment.

Spellings



In the Autumn term spellings are taught through the RML programme. Children will have a short list of spellings sent home each week to learn for a test at the end of the week. We encourage children to keep their spelling list at home for the whole week to read and revise in short regular sessions to internalise them. We provide a writing frame to encourage the 'look, cover, write, check' method, however there are many other ways you can revise spellings at home in written and oral ways. The next slide includes a variety of ideas you can try with your child to make revising

spellings simple and varied.



As the children complete the RML phonics programme they move on to the 'No Nonsense Spelling' programme. This provides the children with daily spelling sessions focussing on word families and spelling rules for more complex words. Again the children will continue to bring home a weekly spelling lists of words to revise for a test.

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Reading

We continue to teach the Read Write Inc. phonics programme in Year 2 up until the end of the Autumn term. The children are grouped based on their reading ability and have targeted teaching at their level to build on their reading and comprehension skills. Pupils receive daily revision of previously taught letter sounds and are taught new letter sounds using the routines of the programme. Children are able to apply their knowledge of reading and comprehension through reading their levelled text and completing linked activities in their RML work books. Children also bring home their RML texts to read.

As the children progress from the RML programme they begin to access the 'Accelerated Reader' programme. Again the children will receive reading texts at their level and will have the opportunity to complete comprehension quizzes linked to the text they have read.





In the Spring term Year 2 pupils will begin whole class reading sessions. These sessions are designed to give children access to longer higher level texts which can be taught and analysed as a class. The texts are broken down into smaller focussed sections which provide a daily stimulus for learning. Children will look at vocabulary in detail and apply skills of inference, prediction, explanation, retrieval and sequencing to gain a deeper understanding of the text.

Curriculum

At St James, we nurture the whole child. Our curriculum recognises children's prior learning experiences and is carefully designed to enrich and inspire pupils to become successful learners. We want our children to be brave, responsible, independent, communicators who are knowledgeable and self-motivated. The curriculum, and supplementary experiences at St James, are integral in developing these and supporting lifelong learning and future success.
